All projects need to include: Your name, Class, Title of Book, Author of Book

Project Options:

1) Write a New Ending/the Next Chapter

- Write 1-3 page new ending (or a first chapter to a sequel) to the book you read. The new chapter should contain the same characters, style, setting, plot, problem (conflict), and theme (message about life) of the book.
- Make a cover sheet of your new ending that illustrates a scene from your chapter. On your cover sheet, include the title of the book you read, the author's name, and your first and last name.

2) Write a Main Idea Summary Essay

- Write a 1-2 page essay that summarizes the main ideas in the book that you read.
- A 3-paragraph essay should have: 1) an introduction about the book you read that includes why you chose it, and how you felt about the main character and events. 2) an explanation of what the main lesson/moral of the story is. 3) a conclusion stating whether you'd recommend the book or not, and why (strengths and weaknesses of the book).
- Make a cover sheet that represents the main ideas, characters, and themes (messages about life) of the book you read. Include the title of the book, the author's name, and your first and last name on your cover sheet.
