### Libraries are in the News!

Public Libraries have made the news a few times recently. And it's not because someone returned a book that was decades overdue. Libraries are in the news because of the fundamental role they play in society.



A September 8 New York Times article posted at http://bit.ly/NYTimesSundayopinion, titled "To Restore Civil Society, Start with the Library" begins with the question "Is the public library obsolete?" (Hint: the answer is "No way!").

The article defines the library as "an example of what I call 'social infrastructure': the physical spaces and organizations that shape the way people interact. Libraries don't just provide free access to books and other cultural materials, they also offer things like companionship for older adults, de facto child care for busy parents, language instruction for immigrants and welcoming public spaces for the poor, the homeless and young people."

The article goes on to state that "Libraries are the kinds of places where people with different backgrounds, passions and interests can take part in a living democratic culture. They are the kinds of places where the public, private and philanthropic sectors can work together to reach for something higher than the bottom line."

A second story posted at http://bit.ly/SlateHumanInterest, portrays the life of the Seward Park Library, located in the Lower East Side of Manhattan, mostly in photographs. The article, titled "The Secret Life of Libraries" shows the vast array of people who come to the library each day and the reasons they do.

Libraries have had to become more than they once were. They now thrive as community spaces where people come together to interact and maintain their health and wellbeing through a commitment to lifelong learning. That's exactly what Marlborough's library means to many.
