

#### Seven Goals. **Much Progress**

June 30 marks the end of the first year of the Marlborough Public Library's Long Range Plan that runs through 2017. A copy is available a t www.marlboroughpubliclibrar y.org. This plan was developed with community input gathered through planning committee meetings and a community survey. All this feedback went into writing the following seven goals. We have made progress on many this first year.

The City of Marlborough will have a public library facility that meets the needs of the **community.** The renovation

of the Children's space celebrated on May 4, 2013 and additional painting and carpeting on the lower level helped us achieve a major part of this goal.

The Marlborough Public Library will respond effectively to changes in local education. Both our Children's and Teen

Departments have been working with the schools to help get the word out about library programs and services that reinforce classroom learning. MPL supports school and home early literacy efforts and seeks to keep children connected to library services throughout their teen years.

\* Residents will view the Marlborough Public Library as a primary source of local **information.** One of our year 2 efforts will be to design a new website that will serve as a communication platform for information about library programs and services, and about resources throughout the City of Marlborough.





# Writing Group for Adults



Marlborough residents, especially children, teens, the ESL community and senior citizens. Staff has been weeding our collections to get rid of items that are no longer of interest and to make space for new titles. The new Children's space has resulted in new programming efforts. Children's staff has reached out to the PTO to tell them about our programs and services. Our Home Delivery service is growing in popularity. We hope to get even more participants and volunteers involved in the program. A Conversation Circle grant will help us update our English language learning collection and subscribe to Mango, a database that will provide online support to ESL patrons and others who would like to learn a new language.

\* The Marlborough Public Library will seek partnership opportunities with businesses, schools, and community organizations to strengthen library services to the community. The Library will seek ways to work with a variety of groups to talk about how the Library can support their initiatives and how they can support our plans for developing library services that meet community needs.

\* The Marlborough Public Library will use technology to facilitate access to information. FY13 City funds enabled us to update all of our public computers. This provides us with a good platform for growth.

\* The Library will increase awareness of the library and its collections, programs and services. The Library's award-winning newsletter, a new website and regular press releases on programs and

## Library Budget and Trust Funds

The Library's primary source of funding is through the City of Marlborough's municipal budget. The library also receives an annual grant from the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners for meeting the criteria set for certified libraries.

Trust funds make up the third source of library funding. Over the years people have left money to the library as part of their estate. Many familiar Marlborough names such as Bigelow, Witherbee, Brigham and others remembered the library in their wills. Some place restrictions on the money, such as it can only be used to buy materials or it has to be used to buy poetry books. Others allow funds to be spent on anything the library needs.

In more recent years, people have continued this tradition and left funds to the Library to support library programs, such as museum passes.

For all of you graphic novel fans out there, you'll be happy to know that we've decided to give this genre its own section, just like in Young Adult and in Children's. They are now located at the end of the DVD section. You'll find some old comic favorites like *Dilbert* and *Doonesbury*, as well as newer series like *Walking Dead* and *Locke* & Key. New graphic novels will be interfiled within the collection. Be sure to check out our display stand, too, with featured books from our growing collection throughout the month of June.

Graphic novels have an unfortunate stigma associated with them; most people who aren't familiar with the genre think they're "just for kids". This couldn't be farther from the truth! There are graphic novels for all ages. The new section is intended for adults ages 18+. For those with little reading time on their hands, graphic novels are great because you can finish one in a couple of hours. They're perfect for 15 minutes before bed reading! There's something for everyone with a variety of genres for every taste from horror to mystery, humor to memoir. Art styles vary just as dramatically, from black and white to full color and everything in between.

"The moon isn't really made out of cheese, Dad," I'd say, and Parker would laugh.




