From the Director



Last month we held a series of public meetings to unveil the design for the library renovation and expansion project. We received lots of feedback that we are currently reviewing.

During the meetings LLB Architects reviewed the floor plans and exterior designs from Witherbee and West Main Streets. We also talked about the parking that will be available on site and how more parking will be developed on city owned property across Witherbee Street.

The architects also discussed how we hope to restore key elements of the historical Carnegie building, such as the Palladium window that may have been covered up when the 1960's addition was constructed and fireplaces that may still be behind library walls. We won't be able to confirm which features remain until construction begins.

We are on track to move to the Walker Building and set up our temporary library space in September 2020 and begin construction in the fall.

We appreciate how excited people are as the project moves forward and look forward to sharing more exciting developments in the months to come.

Hold Redelivery is scheduled to go live the week of March 2, 2020

Hold Redelivery will replace Auto-Checkout for all new and existing holds in OverDrive. Hold Redelivery will give you more flexibility to manage your holds and allow you to suspend a hold even after it's made available to you, while maintaining your place on the waitlist.

By enabling patrons to pass books they don't have time to read on to the next person in line, Hold Redelivery helps the library connect more readers to the books they want when they are ready for them. It also allows those not ready to read a book when it becomes available to them to keep their place on the waitlist until they are ready.

How will it work?

Libby notifications will alert users when their holds become available. There will be a "Notifications" section added to the OverDrive website and the OverDrive app.

After receiving notification that a hold is available, you can borrow the title within three days or suspend the hold by selecting "Deliver Later." After the suspension period (set by the user), the user will be able to borrow the book when the next copy is available.

If the user takes no action, their hold will automatically be suspended as a onetime courtesy for seven days. If no action is taken a second time, the hold will be cancelled automatically.
